- ¹ Numbers in brackets in this column refer to Bennett's grant code for mentioned adjoining landowners. This is my best guess as to the parcel referred to.

The loose pages do not include references to chain carriers and others; nor do they include facsimiles of grants or survey plats.
- ⁴ Three grants included here were listed in Bennett as being in Bladen Co., which is one of Orange's parent counties (and the part that would encompass what was later to become Chatham). I included these grants because the property descriptions seem to indicate that they were in present-day Chatham.
- ⁵ The Mar 1756 survey for James Younger, apparently for the same property described here, refers to Brooks Creek rather than Little Creek, mentions William Marsh's improvements, and says the land is on both sides of the creek near a place called Davey's Folly.
- ⁶ A.B. Markum's map of old Orange Co. grants suggests that this parcel spans the Chatham/Durham boundary.
- ⁷ Although I have not found a map that labels a road the Cape Fear Rd., early maps do show a road that ran south from Cain Creek, along its southern branch/fork, on the east side of Mudlick Creek, crossing the Rocky River about where Rives Chapel Church Road now crosses it. The road then veered southeast, crossing the Deep River about where US 15-501 crosses the Deep River today and continued in a southeastern direction to what is now Fayetteville.
