

### **To School Teachers.**

Editor of The Record:

I would like to ask you if you will allow me space in your paper for the purpose of calling the attention of the school teachers of the county to the important task assigned to them by the authorities of the government in co-operating with the local board in the work of carding questionnaires to be used by the government in ascertaining the place that each registrant is best fitted for when he shall be called to the colors. This is an urgent demand made upon all the teachers of the state and certainly they will not be derelict in their duty to the government in this great crisis. I do not believe the teachers of the county fully understand the importance of responding to demands made upon them in this matter, or they would have long ago fallen in line with the lawyers and doctors and volunteered their services to the government in the work assigned to them. This work is very urgent and should be completed at the earliest possible moment in order that the government may be in possession of these facts when the government shall see proper to call for them. It will not consume any great length of time of any one teacher in the county in discharging their duty along this line. If each teacher in the county will respond to this call and give a few hours of their time to this work it will be completed in a short while. Reports are that school teachers throughout the state are responding to this call in great numbers and are rendering invaluable service to their country in the work assigned them. It is hoped that the teachers in Chatham county will realize the importance of doing their bit and call at the local board and enroll themselves with those who feel that in discharging the task assigned to them they are assisting the government in carrying out the principles for which we are fighting, and which our chief executive has portrayed to all the nations of the earth.
