Our most popular posts, by far, were several reproductions of letters to Santa from Siler City youngsters in 1917. Many people recognized the names of grandparents, parents, or aunts and uncles among the letter-writers. Others found the simplicity of many of the requests for gifts charming.

Indeed, the letters to Santa were less "serious" than some of our other topics, but represent Chatham history nonetheless. They gave a glimpse of popular culture, such as the nature of the gifts requested and the popularity of certain names among the children. Also striking was how many children told Santa that they lived with their grandparents.
