The Smokehouse was removed from the Ag Center site to make room for the new Ag Center building, then stored, rebuilt, and was scheduled to have a Dedication and Open House before COVID. Which didn't happen.

# Annual Program: Rednap Howell and Membership Meeting Recap

Dr. Ted Scott Henson, historian, portrayed Rednap Howell, a key leader of the Regulator Movement from about 1768 to 1771 at the annual CCHA Membership meeting on February 19th.

Dr. Henson was spellbinding, taking listeners back to the beginnings of the Regulator Movement--explaining why back-country Piedmont settlers had had enough of the corruption coming out of Gov. Tryon's government in New Bern and what they did about it. The Regulators were born from the idea that 'the people' regulated their government, not the opposite!

Rednap was at the battle of Alamance May 16, 1771 and became a fugitive for the rest of his life because of his participation. Gov. Tryon pardoned everyone involved except Rednap and one other. Dr. Henson's portrayal of Rednap was complete with recitations of poems written by Rednap.

A report of activities of CCHA was given to all attendees and can be found on the CCHA website.








Pitt Made Pittsboro



#### **Birch Ave Mural Dedication**

## On Sunday, Feb. 26th the community dedicated the new Birch Ave Mural on Birch Ave in Siler City.

The mural commemorates the Birch Ave black merchants with portraits of several of these merchants and the businesses they owned. Businesses included Birch Ave Cafe, Birch Ave Barber Shop, Birch Ave Beauty Shop, Birch Ave TV and Repair and the Poolroom. The jewelry store was a block away.



Black entrepreneurs in the mural include Tod Edwards, Robert Lee Womble, Louise Smith, Henrietta Paterson, Donald Strickland, and Major Farrar.

The Siler City Citizens in Action organization commissioned the mural which was painted by noted mural artist Darlene J. McClinton and her students at NC A&T University.


## Meet one of our Volunteers: Sy Robbins

#### Who's Minding the Store?

As Chatham County becomes the epicenter of growth in North Carolina, many residents justifiably ask, "Who's minding the store?" Well, for one, the Chatham County Historical Association has and is. In particular, the Preservation Committee of the CCHA has been providing input to local governmental entities to document and preserve historical resources in Chatham.

In the Spring of 2021, the CCHA was added, as a voting member, to the Chatham County Technical Advisory Committee, which reviews subdivisions and other development projects in Chatham County, and which sends its findings to the County Planning Board; the CCHA also provides similar input for projects in Siler City through a more informal arrangement with the Town Planning Department. In the Spring of 2022, the CCHA was invited to serve on the Town of Pittsboro's Technical Review Committee, which has similar functions to the County committee.

In the last 2 years, the CCHA has formally provided input on almost 100 projects, focusing on protection of known gravesites, and structures f architectural significance. CCHA input has also included the identification of historic features that may need



preservation and/or documentation, such as barns and other outbuildings, walls, wells, and road traces; areas of possible past Native American habitation (e.g., near surface waters) have also been highlighted. The data sources to make these determinations include the County tax map database (for known cemeteries and surface water features), the North Carolina State Historic Preservation Office's website (for National Register buildings and other houses and structures with architectural significance), as well as aerial photos, filed deeds, and filed surveys (both current and historic).

While the CCHA has no power to prevent growth, it is in a position to at least document what is here that may be lost, and perhaps shape development in a small way so as to preserve the sense of place that makes Chatham County special.
