Spirits of Pittsboro Past Walking Tour

What spirits lurk in downtown Pittsboro?

Experience an out of the ordinary historical walking tour! In the spirit of Halloween, participants will be in search of ghostly spirits



from the town's past. Walk in the

footsteps of those who came before us to see the town and its buildings and sites in a whole new way. Experience the wonder of our shared history through the exploration of "Spirits of Pittsboro Past." Participants will be led through a one-mile tour of downtown Pittsboro visiting historical sites and learning local folklore while encountering "spirits" along the way. We will tour sites such as the

Masonic Lodge, St Barts Church and cemetery, and much more. At the conclusion of

the tour, participants will be invited to a reception and home tour of the oldest surviving building in Chatham County, the "Yellow House" built for Patrick St Lawrence around 1790. Hosts are current owners Ray and Janet Carney. Tickets are \$20 apiece, and the tour is appropriate for ages 12 and above. Tours are Saturdays October 14 and October 28 from 5:30-8:00. Tickets are limited to 40 per night, two tours running simultaneously each evening, and will be available for sale online September 1 on the CCHA website, or in person at the Chatham Historical Museum Wednesday-Friday from 11:00-4:00. National Historic Register: Bynum Update

In the last newsletter Susan Crate, Professor Emeritus of Anthropology told us how she's working with a group to get Bynum on the National Historic Register. She has an update:

A group from Bynum is working to get Bynum on the National Historic



Register. The group began the Bynum Historic Designation project by

researching the process and hosting a community meeting in March 2023. At the meeting Sarah Woodard, the Survey and National Register Branch Supervisor of the State Historic Preservation Office, met with residents within the proposed historic boundary which encompasses about 60-70 structures. The meeting allowed residents to ask questions and understand what National Historic Registration is and would mean for the community.

The process to get on the National Historic Register involves multiple steps. The first step was successfully completed on June 8th when the National Register Advisory Committee approved adding Bynum to a "Study List" for historic designation. The next step will be fundraising efforts to secure a professional consultant to prepare formal National



Register nomination documents and to purchase historical markers. As a part of the fundraising effort, the group is applying for grants and also will launch a GoFundMe campaign after Labor Day. The GoFundMe page will invite all supporters in Chatham County and beyond who acknowledge that Bynum was one of the first textile mills in the state, that it has a rich cultural and socio-economic history, and that it remains, to this day, a vibrant community. Considering Bynum's long history and continued vibrancy to this day, our community is a testament to the fact that history is not just about our past, but it is also a cultural lifeline for today and into the future. This has been a very productive summer for our cemetery volunteers who have added, photographed, or updated several dozen cemeteries. We owe special thanks to Boe Goodwin for documenting several remote sites in the southeastern part of the county, to Angie Pearse for adding hundreds of photos for several previously undocumented sites in northeastern Chatham, to Julie King McDaniel for updating some of the west Chatham sites she has documented over the last decade or so and for joining the cemetery team to help get our records preserved at the state level. Cemetery project coordinator Kelly Gomez continues to monitor and document cemeteries impacted by the

 Manly Law office preliminary drawings have been done by Dan Sundberg, Landscape Architect, and Grim Hobbs, Architect. The drawings define a ramp to the back door of the building that will allow all visitors access to the building. The next step is final drawings and cost estimate.
